CHRISTMAS EVE and CHRISTMAS DAY SERVICE

The Worship Committee, and Fr Jeff met this past October to discuss and plan the upcoming Advent and Christmas season services. Due to the unusual occasion of Christmas Eve (which is Advent number 4) occurring on Sunday December 24 followed by Christmas Day on Monday the 25th, we decided to observe a blended service for both holidays. We will gather on Sunday, Christmas Eve at 2 pm. We felt it was unrealistic to observe both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services considering that some couldn't attend both services. Please remember that this blended service replaces the Sunday service we usually **observe at 10 am.** This gives us some time to have a few meals of day and perhaps time with family before we gather for worship on Sunday, Christmas Eve. The service will begin with lessons from Advent 4 with appropriate hymns. The Christmas gospel story from Luke will be read to signal a shift to hymns like "O Come all ye Faithful "and other joyful hymns. After observing the Holy Eucharist, we will gather downstairs for some refreshments, sing some Christmas Carols and play a game or to. We hope this gives us a time to celebrate while also getting us home before dark.







INSTRUCTIONAL EUCHARIST

On Sunday, November 12th, Fr Jeff led the church with a step-by-step instructional guide in how we as Anglicans worship each Sunday. This effort was requested by a few who were curious about the why and how of our worship. The colors that adorn the lectern/pulpit and altar mark the time of the church year we are remembering the life and ministry of Jesus and the early church. The acolyte and Priest wear a common white garment that covers street clothes to point to the uniqueness and holiness of our worship. The Priest wears a stole around his/her neck to signify a towel of a servant or the yoke of Christ as an ordained person who is yoked to Christ and the ministry of the church.

While we worship in similar ways as other liturgical churches, the Book of Common Prayer is one of our unique features as a church. From the Procession of the crucifer to the first hymn and introductory prayers, we see the "Liturgy of the Word" as our first part of the ascent in worship. The singing of the Gloria links us with the heavenly host akin to the angelic visitation to the shepherd, but also reminds us Isaiah's recognition of the glory of God in Isaiah Chap 6. This emphasis is indicative of the worshipping church on earth and in heaven.

Some of us bow, sit, stand, kneel, sing and generally participate in the service for "liturgy" is the work of the people. We are not spectators watching others perform but those who listen to God as the lector reads and then responds in acclamation that God is speaking to us. One of the Psalms is recited with our response as this was Israel's and the early church's hymnal and the Book of Common Prayer contains the complete Psalter! The Gospel is brought down in the midst of the congregation as we listen and respond to the words and memories of Jesus. The sermon or homily is presented as the church discerns what the Lord is saying to us through the spoken sermon. The Nicene Creed is uplifted to testify to our devotion to the person of Jesus as really human and really divine. After the lector leads all the church in prayer to God for local, national and global needs, we pray the parish prayer that draws all the parish life in a summary statement of why we are here in Raytown, Missouri.

We now move into the "Liturgy of the Table (Eucharist). We present to God our monetary gifts as well as the bread and wine that came forth from the earth. The Eucharist is word derived from "thanksgiving" and that is the emphasis as we begin---then recognizing the holiness of the recognition of water in the wine denoting our eternal connection to the living Christ., divinity and humanity, as we re-represent that Last Supper where Christ gave all for us in the remembrance of the bread and chalice. The prayer of consecration and invocation of the Holy Spirit empowers this encounter as the real presence of Christ who meets us at the table (altar) when we consume the bread and wine. Herein is our most precious activity as we Take and Eat together. We are then recommissioned to go to the world as carriers of this living presence of Christ by deeds and words.

As you consider how you will give in the upcoming year, I encourage each of you to examine your heart and decide how you will sow and what you will reap. Is your heart telling you to sow sparingly or to sow bountifully? Let your heart be your guide. Your tithe goes to the church and flows out to provide the church with what it needs to operate, then it flows out to those we help through our community services and our service to St. Matthews. Please consider pledging the first ten percent of your income so St. Matthews can continue to operate for the benefit of parishioners and the community. Then, further examine your heart and consider how you can give of your time and talents. Go line-by-line through the time and talent sheet and consider how you, your spouse, and your children can give of yourselves. We each are the roots of abundance for St. Matthews. By sowing our seeds abundantly, we will reap abundantly.
