Summer is coming to an end and we begin the journey toward Advent and Christmas. Doesn't feel like it outside, does it!! I hope by the time you read this it will be more comfortable. The choir singers had the summer off but many of them were present to lead hymns all summer. I thank you all for that.

Believe it or not, I've started thinking about music for the next 4 months. Not really planning yet, but definately looking for some music we all will enjoy singing, which is my constant goal. I know that our hymnal has some user UN-friendly music in it, but I've been working on helping everyone sing some that are a little less familiar. I'm playing more of the hymn as an introduction so that you can hear it before we sing, and of course, the choir will help if you listen to them, even if it's only 2 or 3 people. They are stong singers and read music very well.

I had a great summer musically. I sang again with the William Baker Summer Singers of Lee's Summit. This is the 8th summer I have sung with this wonderful group and this summer was probably the most profound and moving music I've ever sung. I'd like to tell you about it. We payed tribute to the 6 million people who died during the Holocaust as well as the people, most non Jewish, who risked their lives to help them during this time. I'm sure you've seen movies or read books about many of these hundreds of people. Oscar Schindler is one of them and if you haven't seen "Schindler's List" you've missed an amazing story. And I know many people were unable to come but it you go to YouTube you can search for these titles and hear the music. If you'd like to have the words I can get you a copy.

We started with "Kaddish in Memory of the Six Million" by Amy Thropp, who directed it herself. We sang it in Hebrew and learned that a Kaddish is a Jewish prayer. Of the five variations the best known is the Mourner's Kaddish, which describes what she wrote. The prayer never mentions death or dying, but instead proclaims the greatness of God.

Then we sang the "The Holocaust Contata" by Donald McCullough. All of the songs were originally in Polish and were found in the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum archives. They were written by prisoners while in Nazi concentration camps and turned into choral works by McCullough. They are sung in English. There are readings before each song which were done by two Rabbis, the wife of one of them and Fr. Tim, Rector of St. Paul's. They were based on interviews, historical data and the story of Irena Augustyfiska Kafka. The readings were hard to hear but our director, Jenni Lahasy, encouraged us to read them before the concerts so that we could tell the stories through our singing without feeling upset. It's very hard to sing when tears are running down your face!

The final song was the beautiful "Even When He is Silent" by Kim Angre Arnesen. The words of this music came from a poem written by someone who was hiding from the Gestapo in underground caves with 9 other Jewish fugitives. They lived there for 4 months in darkness and were never found. The

words were scratched on the wall of the cave and I'm guessing they used candles for some light. The words reflect a great sense of hope which was why this song was chosen as the last song of the concerts.

"I believe in the sun, even when its not shining; (originally "I believe in the sun, though it be dark.")

I believe in love, even when I feel it not; (originally "I believe in neighborly love, though it be unable to reveal itself.")

I believe in God, even when He is silent."

I wish you all blessings and peace in our musical journey.
